

Across

3 Rickettsial disease transmitted by body lice and characterized by skin rash and high fever. (6)

6 An infectious disease of the tropics transmitted by mosquitoes and characterized by rash and aching head and joints. Also called dandy fever and breakbone fever. (6)

7 Infectious bacterial disease of human beings transmitted by contact with infected animals or infected meat or milk products; characterized by fever and headache. (4)

9 A serious contagious viral disease of central western Africa; characterized by fever and inflammation and muscular pains and difficulty swallowing. (5)

11 Sudden prostration due to exposure to the sun or excessive heat. (7)

12 A seasonal rhinitis resulting from an allergic reaction to pollen. Also called hay fever. (10)

14 An atypical pneumonia caused by a rickettsia microorganism and transmitted to humans from infected birds. (6)

16 The form of ratbite fever occurring in the United States. (9)

20 Meningitis caused by bacteria and often fatal. (5)

21 Serious infection marked by intestinal inflammation and ulceration; caused by *Salmonella typhosa* ingested with food or water. Also called typhoid fever. (7)

Down

1 Severe form of malaria occurring in tropical regions. (6)

2 Other name for brain fever. (13)

3 Caused by rickettsial bacteria and transmitted by wood ticks. (4)

4 A seasonal rhinitis resulting from an allergic reaction to pollen. Also called pollinosis. (3)

5 An acute communicable disease (usually in children) characterized by fever and a red rash. (7)

8 Either of two infectious diseases transmitted to humans by the bite of a rat or mouse; characterized by fever and headache and nausea and skin eruptions. (7)

10 Marked by recurring high fever and transmitted by the bite of infected lice or ticks; characterized by episodes of high fever and chills and headache and muscle pain and nausea that recur every week or ten days for several months. (9)

13 A highly infectious animal disease (especially cattle and

sheep); it can be transmitted to people. (7)

15 Serious infection marked by intestinal inflammation and ulceration; caused by *Salmonella typhosa* ingested with food or water. Also called enteric fever. (7)

17 An infection of the lungs and skin characterized by excessive sputum and nodules. (6)

18 Disease of rodents (especially rabbits and squirrels) and sometimes transmitted to humans by ticks or flies or by handling infected animals. Also called deer fly fever. (6)

19 A fit of shivering. (4)
