

- 2 A group of steamships operating together under the same ownership. (5)
- 4 The land bordering a usually large body of water. (5)
- 8 A ___ bill of lading provides

for the carriage of goods by water, from their point of origin to their final destination, either by successive ocean carriers or by more than one mode of transportation. (7)

9 A visible collection of minute particle matter, such as water droplets and/or ice

crystals, in the free air. (5)

11 A vessel habitually employed on a regular schedule and loading and discharging at specified ports. (5)

14 Permission given to a ship to use a port without quarantine after it has been certified free of

disease by competent health authorities. (4,8)

15 A long horizontal or sloping piece of wood, metal, or other material that is used as a barrier or support. (4)

16 Imprudently incurring risk. (4)

20 Making a ship is as much an ____ as is science. (3)

21 A maritime contract (now almost obsolete) by which the owner of a ship borrows money for equipping or repairing the vessel and, for a definite term, pledges the ship as security--it being stipulated that if the ship be lost in the specified voyage or period, by any of the perils enumerated, the lender shall lose his money. A similar contract creating a security interest in the cargo is called a respondentia. (8)

22 A ____ bill of lading is issued when goods have been loaded aboard the ship. (7)

23 Acronym for less than a container load. Here the carrier takes the goods from two or more shippers, packs them into the container and seals it. (3)

24 The doctrine requiring courts of one state to recognize the laws of foreign states and judgments of competent courts of such states. (6)

1 A structure extending into a body of water to direct and confine the stream or tidal flow to a selected channel. (5)

3 A record book carried aboard a ship in which all significant events relating to the journey are recorded by the ship's officers authorized to make such entries. (3)

5 An ____ bill of lading provides for delivery of the goods to the order of a specified person, by words such as "consigned to XYZ Co. Ltd. or to order or assigns". (5)

6 A rule of evidence whereby a person is barred from denying the truth of a fact that has already been settled. (8)

7 Under this method a ship is chartered for a one-way voyage between specific ports with a specified cargo at a negotiated rate of freight. (6,7)

9 Any accident involving two or more vessels. (9)

12 An open vessel with a handle and a spout for pouring. (4)

13 Loss or damage caused to the ship or cargo by the wilful act or the master or seamen. (8)

14 The sum charged for riding in a conveyance. (4)

18 A principle of fundamental fairness and justice. (6)

19 Seizure of a ship (and sometimes cargo and/or freight) by an admiralty court to provide pre-judgment security for the plaintiff's maritime claim. (6)

21 Release after a security has been paid. (4)
